Friday, February 5: "Celebrating Our Talents"



Religious Education

The Greatest Church Teacher

Today is the Memorial Feast Day of Saint Thomas Aquinas who, by universal consent is the foremost spokesperson of the Catholic tradition of reason and of divine revelation. He is one of the great teachers of the medieval Catholic Church, honored with the titles Doctor (teacher) of the Church and Angelic Doctor.

Thomas was most likely born in the castle of Roccasecca, near Aquino, controlled at that time by the Kingdom of Sicily around 1225. He was born to the most powerful branch of the family, and his father was a man of means. Thomas's mother, Theodora, belonged to the prominent Rossi branch of the Neapolitan Caracciolo family. While the rest of the family's sons pursued military careers, at the age of five, Thomas was given to the Benedictine monastery at Monte Cassino in his parents' hopes that he would choose that way of life and eventually became an abbot. At the time in history, it was a high and noble honor to become a leader of a monastery or religious order. In 1239, he was sent to Naples to complete his studies. It was here that he was first attracted to Greek philosophy and the teachings of Aristotle.

But by 1243, Thomas abandoned his family's plans for him and joined the Dominican Order, much to his mother's dismay. Angered, she ordered Thomas' brothers to find and capture him and bring him home, where he was kept at the Castle of Monte San Giovanni Campano for over a year against his will. Once free, he went to the University of Paris where he finished his studies with Saint Albert the Great. Because Thomas was quiet and didn't speak much, some of his fellow students thought he was slow. But Albert prophetically exclaimed: "You call him the dumb ox, but in his teaching he will one day produce such a bellowing that it will be heard throughout the world."

He eventually held two professorships at Paris, lived at the court of Pope Urban IV, directed the Dominican schools in Rome, and combated false Church teaching. His greatest contribution to the Catholic Church is his writings. The unity, harmony, and continuity of faith and reason, of revealed and natural human knowledge, pervades his many books and writings. One might expect Thomas, as a man of the gospel, to be an ardent defender of revealed truth. But he was broad enough, deep enough, to see the whole natural order as coming from God the Creator, and to see reason as a divine gift to be highly cherished. The *Summa Theologiae*, his last and, unfortunately, uncompleted work, deals with the whole of Catholic theology. He stopped work on it after celebrating Mass on December 6, 1273. When asked why he stopped writing, he replied, "I cannot go on.... All that I have written seems to me like so much straw compared to what I have seen and what has been revealed to me." He died March 7, 1274.

When he was canonized a saint, his feast day was celebrated on March 7, the day of his death. But since this date commonly falls within the Season of Lent, the Church moved his memorial to January 28th. Saint Thomas Aquinas is a towering example of Catholicism in its broadness, universality, and inclusiveness. We should follow his example and exercise the divine gift of

reason in each of us - our power to know, learn, and understand. At the same time, we should thank God for the gift of his revelation, especially in Jesus Christ. Saint Thomas Aquinas is the Patron Saint of Catholic Schools, Colleges, and Students.


www.olgcs.org Re-Enrollment Open Now (Current Families) – Deadline February 12, 2021

There is a non-refundable deposit of \$50.00 per family. The deposit will be processed through FACTS Management as early as two business days of re-enrollment. Please do not send re-enrollment deposits to the school.

Students are not registered until the deposit for 2021-22 is paid and the tuition for the 2020-21 school year is current. Families not current with tuition may re-enroll when they bring their account to current status.

Since open enrollment for new families begins on February 15, 2021, there is no guarantee there will be space available in the classroom for current students who re-enroll after the February 12, 2021 deadline.
